Nadja



Nadja is living with Shelley and she will be 98 years old in May.

When Nadja was a child the family farm had a one room house that was heated by a rock fireplace. They had a wood burning stove where her mother would make 5 - 7 loaves of bread a week twice a week.

The farm provided what they needed, potatoes, carrots, cabbage, bets, onions, cucumbers, tomatoes, peanuts and wheat. Nadja's father took the whet to town to have it ground into flour. They also had apple and peach trees.

Sunflower seeds were dried in the sun and then baked in the oven. The seeds were put into a barrel 2 feet tall. They would offer guests sunflower seeds and peanuts. Nadja's family would crush some peanuts for cheesecake pie crusts.

The animals had their own sheds: horses, cows, pigs, chickens, sheep, and geese. Nadja's father made a wagon and plow for the 2 horses to pull. He made a sleigh for wintertime. The horses would pull the entire family. The snow would get to the height of Nadja's neck. Her father also made snow skis from specific trees that would bend in the oven. He made Nadja ice skates from wood and wire. She would skate on the frozen pond across the farm with other children from the community.

Nadja's mother boiled water to wash their clothes. They cut wool from their sheep to make thread to knit socks. Both boys and girls learned to knit. If boys wanted socks, they had to make their own.

Nadja would walk to church barefoot to keep her favorite pair of shoes clean. The children usually went swimming in the river after church to cool off in the summertime. The family went to the river a few times a week to bathe.

One day her sister Olga got swept up in a fast current. The other children tried to save her. Unfortunately, she had drowned. They were able to retrieve Olga's body to bury her in the church cemetery. At the time of Olga's death, Nadja's mother was pregnant with Reggie who died at 2 years old with scarlet fever. Reggie was buried at the same cemetery as Olga

How Can I "Be Love"? By DeEtte Waleed

"When day comes, we ask ourselves, where can we find light in this never-ending shade?"

—Amanda Gorman, "The Hill We Climb"

"How long, O Great Mystery, how long?" I ask as I turn off the news of yet another act of senseless violence ending the lives of innocent people. As a mother, grandmother, and great-grandmother, I am filled with anger and fear but also compassion—and questioning.

I'm curious about these shooters. What happened in their young lives that they had to seek the attention of the world by shooting others? What has caused them to seek "fame" in such a violent way? What causes a person to kill people they don't know in order to be accepted, to be recognized?

#ENOUGH

How many mothers' tears does it take to heal our wounds? Not only the tears of Black mothers and Native mothers, but the tears of white mothers too? Will it make a difference that the tears are now coming from blue eyes?

Amanda Gorman reminds us that there is always "light in this neverending shade;" that love can be our legacy "if only we're brave enough to be it." How can I be love instead of being anger and fear? It's easy to love my grandchildren when they agree with me. When they don't, I say my truth and then shut my mouth—even when that's hard. So how often do I need to say, "violence is not the answer," or "don't kill," when the shootings keep repeating?

I'm not sure I know how to *be love* towards someone who seems so far from me, but I know I want to try. Instead of putting more fear and anger into the world, I can close my mouth and send love-energy to all parents of difficult children, including those who are hardest to love. Like any change in my life, I can only do it one small act, one small thought at a time. I can only pray it will be enough.

Prayer: Mamma God, wrap us and all our children in your arms of love. Give us the courage to be love even when we are afraid. Blessed be.
