Minister's Message

Greetings and Salutations. The air is cold and crisp and every day is one to ponder what will happen? Will it snow? Will schools be closed? Will there be a sale at Tops? Will human rights be obstructed in the new government? So many possibilities of what can be. It can bring a plethora of feelings and reactions. But hear me dear ones, there is always hope. Hope for better times, for ice free driving, for double coupon days. Hope guides us everyday. Within our hope is also our action. An election may have named someone to an office; but it did not take away our voice, our energy or our ability to speak out and hold accountable those who would violate our freedoms. It is the legacy of Unitarian Universalists to speak truth to power and to be on the side of love. UUA President, Rev. Peter Morales, shared this with the UU Ministers Association and gave permission for it to be shared with all. I include it because he so eloquently says what I want to say to you. Know that our action "BE KIND" has been added to the UUA site listed below. May we continue to be a church, a faith, a power for love and justice for all. Blessed be, Sue

Dear Colleagues,

These are tough times. We are living in the midst of historic cultural turmoil. Long festering resentments are being unleashed, posing immediate threats to the most marginalized in our society and presenting long term danger to our natural environment.

People are understandably anxious. I hear reports of a spike in attendance at worship services across the country. I can only imagine the pastoral demands you are facing—at a time when we ministers are in as much need of support as our congregants.

Thank you. Thank you for your courage, your perseverance, your faithfulness.

I believe we are entering dangerous times. I expect that the new administration will unleash human rights abuses aimed at migrants and Muslims shortly after it takes office. In the longer term, other marginalized groups (women, the poor, people of color, transgender people, etc.) will be in danger. We are already seeing an increase in violent acts by people who see the election as validation of their hate.

Among the dangers we face is the temptation to "normalize" the situation. I pray that the incoming administration will prove to be more humane than its rhetoric and many of its most ardent supporters. I see no evidence that this is the case. None. It is irresponsible folly to act as though we are in a normal transition between administrations.

We must prepare to provide sanctuary and resist.

First, we must provide sanctuary in the broadest and richest sense of the term. We begin with offering safe places for reflection and healing for our congregants and for those coming to seek spiritual community. But these times demand more. We must provide sanctuary to those most vulnerable. In particular, migrants (primarily from Mexico and Central America) may well face mass deportation. In addition, Muslims have been targeted.

Second, we must prepare to resist human rights violations in active ways. We must make it much harder to deport, register, discriminate and despoil.

In the past most of our work for justice and compassion has been positive. We have been advocates for marriage equality, racial justice, civil rights, immigration reform and environmental justice. To use a sports metaphor, we have played offense. We joined with others to advance an agenda. Today we must prepare to “play defense.” We will have to respond quickly to acts of the government. We will have to react rather than act. We will need to be agile and fast.

As always, the key will be to work together. We have shown our ability to do this from resisting the human rights violations of Joe Arpaio in Arizona to joining in the resistance at Standing Rock. We are effective when our congregations and ministers work together at the local level, combined with support from regional and national staff. We make a difference when we form strong partnerships with other faith groups and secular organizations. At the national level, we are working to form partnerships with other faith groups and other UU organizations. My office is working with Multicultural Growth and Witness staff and with our field staff. The UUA, Unitarian Universalist Service Committee and our shared College of Social Justice are working together closely. I have had a number of meetings with my counterparts in other faiths. Don Southworth, Executive Director for the Unitarian Universalist Ministers Association, and I are holding a series of listening meetings with ministers across the country.

In the coming weeks you will hear more as we work together to support you. For now, I want each of you to know that you are not alone. Together we are strong. Together we inspire one another. Together we can do this. We need one another.

Thank you again for all you do.


Love will guide us. Hope will sustain us. Ultimately we shall prevail.

We will always remember these dear ladies for all the ways they have contributed to our church. We are better people for having known them.

With the New Year comes hope for the future. While for many, the political future in 2017 seems ominous and murky, it is so comforting to be part of our church family. First UU is literally a sanctuary for us during good times and bad. Our church is known for its work in the greater community, whether it is knitting gloves and hats, building houses as a part of Habitat for Humanity, supporting the work of Pints For Progress, the Niagara Beautification Commission, or purchasing toilet paper for the poor at Heart, Love and Soul Food Pantry. (See the article in the Niagara Gazette for more information on this story.) Indeed, this outreach is central to our mission to "Learn, Love, and Build a Better World." For our church to support the community at large, it is necessary to secure the financial future of our church. The Board of Trustees, upon the recommendation of three committees of the church and a Congregational Special Meeting, was to craft the parameters for a Legacy Fund. A Legacy Fund provides a vehicle for tax deductible charitable donations. A portion of monies accrued could be invested to build upon the fund balance. Once this important work is completed, I will call for another Special Congregational Meeting to affirm the process. This initiative is a major step to provide for the sustainability of our church.




It is with deep sorrow that we notify you of the deaths

and are now at peace.


Reinhild Vadla
